A Letter from the CEO

Hillcroft Service's mission, "to provide innovative services and supports for People with disabilities and their families; resulting in extraordinary differences in People's lives", was fulfilled yet again this past fiscal year. 620 individuals were assisted through a variety of programs. Hillcroft is proud of the high levels of satisfaction received from the services provided. 98.2% reported overall satisfaction and no individual program received below an 85% satisfaction rating.

Much like any other, this past year was fruitful for Hillcroft Services. The newest program, Music Therapy, more than doubled in size. It also coordinated its first community performance that was held at the Civic Theatre. This was to celebrate the month of March as Disability Awareness month.

March 2016 marked Hillcroft's 6th CARF survey resulting in a 3 year accreditation. For the first time Hillcroft included the ABA Clinic in this accreditation process resulting in their first accreditation.

We also began a strategic initiative to engage our community through many, many tours of our facilities to educate individuals about the services provided by Hillcroft. Numerous individuals who have lived in this city for years were amazed at what they witnessed. This has given an awareness to people that didn't exist until they saw operations with their own eyes. We have witnessed tears of admiration and smiles of joy when people realize what Hillcroft does on behalf of members of their community.

For several years now, Hillcroft has been exploring the possibility of merging the numerous facilities in which programming takes place in this community. I am excited to report that this year we have taken the first step to fulfil this dream. A partnership with the City of Muncie and the Muncie Redevelopment Commission has resulted in us taking possession of the shell building located at 501 W Air Park Drive here in Muncie. Our next initiative is to expand this existing building by another 45,000 square feet which will provide the necessary space to consolidate our adult

services under one roof. This expansion will

allow for needed growth and the flexibility for change in the future. This next year we will be reaching out to the community for the first time ever to support this facility project.

Hillcroft continues to be dedicated to the people we serve by being innovative in programming design and finding ways to be more efficient with the resources available. Our future plans will require the use of innovation to continue to meet the changing needs of people with disabilities and our funding source mandates. Hillcroft realizes that developing life-long partners is a vital link in our future success. Please join us by helping Hillcroft build on the future and support all individuals with disabilities as they strive to be integrated, independent, contributing members of this community. Our services include:



Hillcroft ABA Clinic offers behavioral treatment for children with autism spectrum disorders. Based upon the principles and technology of ABA, Applied Behavioral Analysis, Hillcroft ABA Clinic provides intensive therapy, individualized academic instruction, and social skills training for children starting at age 2.

Employment Services

Hillcroft's Employment Services programs support individuals with disabilities in achieving greater independence through developing and maintaining the skills needed for employment.



Hillcroft Industries, the industrial division of Hillcroft Services, employs nearly 400 adults with disabilities to provide subcontract work for businesses in East Central Indiana.



Hillcroft's Reliable Transit provides safe and reliable transportation to individuals using Medicaid, Medicaid Waiver, or private pay.

Residential Services

A Mother's Story of Love - Diane Benadum

Our son, James Spencer Benadum, named after his 2 Grandfathers, was born 6 ½ weeks early on April 29, 1970. His early delivery was just the start of many trials to come, but fortunately he weighed more than 6 pounds at birth, so we went home "on time" but with what they called preemie nipples for the bottles because he had a weak sucking ability.

I am going to condense the next several weeks and pick up on the day of a regular checkup where Dr. Young measured Jim's head circumference and then measured it a second time..., but saying nothing to me. Well, I went home and measured his head myself and then the next day I measured it again and I had an even bigger number! So we called the doctor and he told us to come in—that we needed to talk.

So, on June 11, 1970 (44 days after birth) we were headed to Riley Children's Hospital with Jim to have him examined for a diagnosis and then the possibility of surgery as our doctor suspected that he had Hydrocephalus (more commonly called water on the brain). Well, indeed, that was the diagnosis and surgery to install a shunt in his brain to drain off the bodily fluid was performed. To explain, the fluid that we all have in our body circulates from head to toe, but with Hydrocephalus there is a stoppage in the brain area, so hence a shunt is installed. I tell you, we are so lucky because the "shunt" was invented in 1956 by an engineer whose son was born with hydrocephalus and he refused to accept "there was nothing to be done". As a side note, I have learned that it is now possible to detect this birth defect and to install the shunt while the baby is still in the womb! Medicine has certainly come a long way!

Well, back to my story- finally, after 13 days at Riley, on June 24th we were heading home. We had had a whirlwind of activity! Through Jim's life he has had to have several revisions to his shunt - From lengthening to malfunctions. His last revision was a complete system installed in 2009. Today Jim, at age 46, sees a specialist in Indianapolis for headaches, seizures, and fits of rage. The doctors tell us that they are seeing these exact same things in other individuals with hydrocephalus and that when we have questions, we must keep in mind that all of this is new even to the doctors, as they have no research history on which to base treatment. Now Hillcroft comes into the picture:

In 1972 we were contacted by Hillcroft for the first time. Anne Condran says Jim was her second client. I think the program was called Home Start, covering from birth to age 3. A person would come to our home on a regular basis and I can remember taking Jim to the College Avenue Methodist Church on Fridays for a play group for the kids and socialization for the parents.

Then when he was 3 he was in the preschool class at Hillcroft. One of the teachers was Janet Milazzo. At age 4 Jim attended a regular preschool 2 or 3 days a week with the other 2 or 3 days going back to Hillcroft. I believe it was just about this time when it was rumored that the Board of Directors at Hillcroft was contemplating the closing of the preschool. Well you better believe I was on the front row in the audience at that next board meeting pleading with them not to close the preschool! I guess you would say that was the beginning of my very active involvement with Hillcroft! And, I am very happy to tell you that the preschool was not closed.

Jim did well enough in a regular kindergarten class at Royerton Elementary and his verbalization skills were so good, that we decided to try a first grade/kindergarten split. It was during this time that we had to face the fact that special education was needed. So the next phase for Jim was the city school special education classes where he stayed until he was 21, graduating from Muncie Central H.S. in1991. Jim has now been in services here at Hilleroft full time since high school.

Now unfortunately Jim has not been a part of Residential Services. You see our plan was for Jim to go into one of Hillcroft's group homes after graduating from high school. However, at that same time the State & Federal Government decided that there were many people inappropriately placed at the State Mental Hospital in New Castle and ordered all of these people out and into group homes. with people coming from families, like us, not getting any placements into group homes unless it was an emergency situation! Hence, Jim is still with us and he never talks of leaving. I think he knows when he has it good!!

As far as Employment Services, Jim has tried working with a job coach on two different jobs. But Jim has a problem perhaps you hadn't thought of. He looks "normal" and with his verbalization skills, his bosses seemed to expect too much. Even his first job coach had to call a meeting to cancel the job because the boss kept losing help and giving more and more work to Jim. Even the job coach, Phil Carter, couldn't keep up!

Jim also has what is called a form of selective memory where the information is in there, but he cannot readily remember it maybe today, but tomorrow or maybe even next week it would all be there. That is, unless it has to do with music. Just a few bars of a song and he can tell you the artist and the title. Now, Jim doesn't even talk about a job in the community because he prefers to work at the workshop where he has excelled through the years. Jim has gone from only being able to do one thing to being able to work on several different jobs in one day. He even cleans the lunch room in another building 2 days per week—this in addition to working in the workshop. On another side note, I am looking forward to Hillcroft's goal to bring even larger numbers of nondisabled individuals from the community to work alongside our clients in Hillcroft Industries, thereby having an integrated workforce. Now at a meeting just two weeks ago I learned that the State would call this Reverse Integration. I don't care what it is called, it would be wonderful! Jim is also currently being served in Therapy Services. Jim is currently also being served also in Therapy Services. Hillcroft starting Reliable Transit-- providing door to door transportation to work and back home has been Great! -giving Jim a real sense of responsibility and independence. But I have to tell you a little story on myself: after approximately 23 years of delivering him to Hillcroft by 8 a.m. and being available to pick him up each day at 3 p.m. (while I was selling real estate for 20 years), for the first 2 to 3 weeks of the transportation service, I could get absolutely nothing accomplished!!!!! **I've told that story often and usually people fully understand what I am talking about. We are also very proud of Jim as he is active in Delaware County Special Olympics and was picked by the state to represent Indiana in the sport of BOCCE at 3 National Special Olympic Games, in Ames, Iowa in 2006, Lincoln, Nebraska in 2010, and then in 2014 at Princeton. New Jersey. Jim also plays unified golf and is in a unified bowling league. Now, by Unified, I mean that he has a partner who does not have a disability. My husband David and I also bowl in the league, but not on Jim's team, we are partners with 2 other young men. I was fortunate to have known all three families who started Hillcroft Services. The Kings and their daughter Judy, Louise Satrayan, and of course Jeannette Taylor. I tell you for certain, my husband and I are in their debt for having the foresight of the need for this organization! I, frankly, don't know what we would have done for our son had we not had Hillcroft to turn to!
